#### GGA News

##### Spring Field Day wrap up

The GGA has visited nine field days since the last edition of Newswire, starting in the north and working our way down to Esperance. The target this year was to get out to more of the smaller groups to see what support the GGA can provide them.

A beautiful spring day at WANTFA kicked off the field days, where the group tried out a new format, splitting up into groups and rotating through the different trial sites. Trials on show included variety trials, time of sowing, lime incorporation and much more.

The Mingenew-Irwin Group attracted a large crowd of close to 250, with highlights being guest speak Kim Hughes, a soil amelioration panel session with local growers sharing their stories on how they improve their soil and Peter Newman concluding the day talking about the management practices he would implement if he was a Mingenew farmer.

The Holt Rock Group held a formal dinner on Tuesday 9th Sept to celebrate 28 years and honored five life members (another big celebration after Hyden won the grand final a few days earlier!). The field day covered wheat varieties, wide row lupins, N management strategies and canola sustainability audit and provided a great platform for discussion facilitated by local consultants. The highlight of the day was a tour of the Kerrigan Valley Beef feedlot.

The new Merredin group MADFIG hopped on a bus and went to tour a corporate farming enterprise, Warrakiri Cropping - see spotlight for more information.

Nyabing Farm Improvement Group, with a group of 45 attendees, focused on pastures in their morning session, visiting an MLA trial site north of town. Presentations were given over lunch (voted best of the field days!) and the afternoon was spent looking at trials on pH, soil health, sub soil constraints and nutrition.

Stirlings to Coast field day kicked off with a glyphosate sustainability trial and magnificent views of the Stirling Ranges. The group again broke attendance records as their trials program continues to grow, covering variety and agronomy trials, drones and their use in a farming enterprise and an impressive MLA broad scale pasture trial.

The final week saw the GGA head to Esperance to attend the Cascade, North Mallee and Neridup field days. SEPWA variety trials continue to be highly valued by growers in the port zone, showcased at all the regional events.

Although it was impossible to make it to every field day, there were reports of high attendance, innovative programs, and strong enthusiasm from other groups. For those we missed, keep the GGA informed about your next event and we will aim get out and find out what your group is up to.

It's a privilege for the GGA to attend group events and important for us to keep up to date with what groups are doing, their research priorities and need for support - this leads to a strong network and helps the GGA facilitate linkages for collaboration in the future.

### Grain growers to benefit from R4R high-tech project

The State Government has invested \$10 million from the Royalties for Regions program in a high-tech project to help Western Australian grain growers produce more profitable crops - the e-Connected Grainbelt.

The project is designed to provide WA grain growers with more timely, accurate and relevant information to make informed management decisions, and will seek to establish the e-Connected Grainbelt Network, an open data exchange system to harness and combine a range of information, such as paddock records, weather observations, weather forecasts, financial updates and research outcomes. ### WA grower awarded Nuffield Scholarship

Stirlings to Coast member and South Stirlings grower Reece Curwen has been awarded a prestigious Nuffield scholarship, supported by the GRDC, at the 2014 Nuffield Australia National Conference in Launceston.

Nuffield scholarships support young, innovative growers to become future leaders of our industry and are an integral part of the GRDC's investment into capacity building for the grains industry.

Mr Curwen will use his scholarship to investigate the dynamics between broadacre farming and the management systems used to maximise productivity, particularly through the ability to manage scale, as staff, plant and finance demands pose challenges for those managing large properties.

As cropping manager of his family's 9500 hectare broadacre mixed farming property, he is responsible for a 6500ha cropping program, including canola, barley and wheat. In addition, the enterprise includes 10,000 ewes.

## Funding Opportunities

### GRDC External Investment Plan 2015-16

The GRDC Investment Plan, available at [www.grdc.com.au](http://www.grdc.com.au), offers a number of opportunities for grower groups to apply or collaborate on.

The GGA are currently working with researchers, grower groups and other potential partners to make links where required and assistance is available to all groups in developing their projects and applications.

Of particular interest to grower groups is the Regional Cropping Solution Network Fast Track Projects, which offer multiple opportunities for grower groups to link with industry partners to investigate an issue or activity that has been identified as a priority in each of the five port zones by the RCSN groups. GRDC will invest up to \$130,000 in each port zone, with tenders for a single project ranging from \$1,000-\$40,000. Projects must provide an answer or outcome within 12 months, have a strong focus on extension and strong collaboration with industry. Projects can deliver across multiple port zones.

The GGA can work with groups to assist in developing projects, making connections, editing applications and with any other aspects of the project and tender process. This FREE service is available to all GGA grower groups - make sure you utilise it to your advantage!  
Applications close Tuesday 29 October.

### Regional Crop Updates EOI

### **Merredin and Districts Farm Improvement Group (MADFIG)**

#### **Understanding decision making in a corporate farming structure**

On the 11th of September, 22 growers along with members of the Kellerberrin Demonstration Group attended a field tour of Marwarra property east of Merredin, managed by Tony Murfit. The tour was focused around liming, weed control and the farming business model.

The group attended trials on the property focused on liming and the ways to maximize the returns made from liming as well as the impacts on soil pH and subsoil acidity. The group then learnt about Marwarra's rotations for weed control, where it was seen that a fallow, canola, cereal rotation was in place. It was concluded that the fallowing achieved a better control on weeds, especially ryegrass.

The discussion around the corporate farming business model included agronomy, rotations, decision making and highlighted the importance of maintaining a professional and focused approach.

MADFIG are a relatively new group, however they have achieved a good thinking atmosphere and provide opportunities for discussion between growers. The MADFIG group is open to any growers in the Merredin and surrounding region that wish to join.
