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Dear Partners and stakeholders,

Welcome to the latest monthly newsletter from the South-West WA Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hub (SW WA Hub).

You may have already heard some recent announcements by the Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia David Littleproud that have exciting implications for Australia's eight Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hubs.

The Australian Government has <u>announced</u> it will provide the Hubs with \$20 million in additional funding, including \$2.5m for the SW WA Hub, and that they will evolve beyond targeting drought to being focused on agricultural innovation more broadly. The Grower Group Alliance and SW WA Hub have welcomed this news in a <u>media release</u>.

A <u>National Agricultural Innovation Policy Statement</u> has also been released by the Government, as explained in this <u>media release</u> from Minister Littleproud.

This statement establishes four long-term priorities for Australia's agricultural innovation system to address by 2030. These priorities are exports, climate resilience, biosecurity and digital agriculture.

The SW WA Hub, along with other Hubs, will work closely with Government, Partners and stakeholders to see how it will contribute to the new innovation statement and its priority areas.

The expanded remit does not impact our focus on providing networks for researchers, farmers and community groups to work together to enhance drought resilient practices – that remains a core focus.

A priority for the recently-appointed Hub team is the continued engagement with as many of our 52 Hub Partners and other stakeholders as possible.

## Second grant round now open for community drought resilience program

It has partnered with the <u>Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR</u>) to boost community connectedness and collaboration with a focus on building drought resilience across agriculture-dependent communities in rural, regional and remote Australia.

FRRR has announced the 33 successful recipients and projects who will benefit from the first round of the program.
